Care4Kids Providers Fight for a Fair Contract

150 Supporters Highlight Childcare Crisis on the 55th Anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s Assassination

On April 4th, I 50 Care4Kids providers and our allies in Recovery For All called on Governor Lamont to offer a fair and honorable contract that will address their health-

care, wage and retirement concerns.

There is no question following the pandemic that qual-

ity, affordable and accessible childcare is at the very foundation of a strong economy. Simply continue onto page 5

Legislative Session Update

The countdown to the last day of the Legislative Session, June 6th, has begun and it seems everyone under the gold dome is rushing to push along their

legislative priorities before the clock strikes midnight.

This month, we saw the Appropriations Committee and the Finance, Revenue and Bonding

Comittee respond to the Governor's proposed budget, approving their versions of the spending and revenue sides of the budget.

Our Political Education Director, Daniel I. Medress explains what members can expect to see next, "These bills form the basis of the budget negotiations that now will occur between the House, the Senate, the Governor, and the Caucuses. Due to the Constitutional spending cap, the budget surplus is a bit of an illusion. The surplus exists, but without a super majority vote in both chambers, the Constitutional spending cap prevents additional appropriations.

Currently, discussions are under way about utilizing what's called a "revenue intercept" to capture money before it reaches the General Fund (the spending cap only applies to money spent from the General Fund).

"With a revenue intercept, money that comes into the state is put into a dedicated fund, as opposed to the General Fund. Currently, this happens with certain federal dollars for healthcare and transportation."

CSEA members and our allies were encouraged when Speaker Ritter and President Looney hinted at the idea of a revenue intercept plan in a joint statement they issued after the votes in Appropriations and Finance, "As we move forward, we will be looking at finding ways to bolster funding in a number of critical areas — including non-profits, public schools, higher education, health care and child care workers, paraprofessionals and group homes."

The specific mention of our child care workers and

Pandemic Pay Look-Up Tool for SEBAC Members

The State's Pandemic Pay Award Look-up Portal will be available on the morning of Monday, April 24th. This look-up tool is based upon the state's records and will provide members with their current risk designation and the amount of the pandemic pay award they will receive. This will allow members to review that information

and raise any concerns they have about the accuracy of the information presented. Remember that higher risk employees are first responders, employees who worked in congregate settings, and employees who worked in health care facilities during the relevant time period (March 20, 2020-March 27, 2021). Lower risk employees

are any other employees who were required to report in-person during that time period. The portal will also include a link to a union form that will allow members to request review of their

pandemic pay award amount by their CSEA and SEBAC if they think it is incorrect.

We expect the state to issue the pandemic pay no later than the first pay period following June 7, 2023 except where there is dispute about the amount.

A Note for State Retirees with State Retiree Spouses:

If you and your spouse are both State of Connecticut Retirees, then you may want to consider who holds your Health Insurance benefit in order to save cash at the pharmacy.

Your date of hire dictates your tier, whereas your retirement date dictates your group—both are important in determining your health and pension benefit, but the group determines your prescription drug co-pay. And since co-pays are based on the insurance holder, not the patient, you may want to consider having the person with the lowest group number (that is the person who retired first most often) hold the insurance for the both of you.





continued from page I put, when families do not have childcare, they cannot be participatory in our workforce, and in most cases



this results in a mass exodus of women leaving the workforce. Care4Kids is an aspirational state-funded program targeted at the childcare costs for low-to-moderate income

families through a partnership with the State, families in the program and providers (as well as the federal monies that cover about 85% of the program costs).

The Care4Kids workforce is predominantly women of color and this program offers them an opportunity to work when they may not otherwise be able to due to their own childcare needs.

Unfortunately, providers receive \$0 in healthcare benefits, despite working in a state-funded program, and with an effective hourly rate of just \$8.50, this often means providers are going without the necessary medical care.

From emails and calls to legislators, to sharing social media posts and attending press conferences and rallies, to testifying and submitting op-eds to local news sources, members have been raising their collective voices to demand more from our elected leaders.

Below is an update from Daniel Medress on several pieces of legislation that CSEA members are pushing at the Capitol:

School Paraeducator Advisory Council Legislative Proposal:

House Bill 6881:AN ACT **CONCERNING VARIOUS RE-**VISIONS TO THE EDUCATION STATUTES RELATED TO EDU-CATOR COMPENSATION AND PARAEDUCATORS was

not called for a vote in the Appropriations Committee prior to the committee's Joint Favorable deadline. While this is frustrating, lobbyists have been having positive conversations with House and Senate leadership and the Governor's office about passing significant paraeducator legislation this session.

As a reminder, none of the legislative progress made over the past several sessions happened as a result of a bill being introduced and making it to the

Governor's desk. But rather, because ideas in bills that died were placed into other pieces of legislation that were ultimately signed into law.

Paid Sick Days Expansion:

Senate Bill 1178: AN ACT **EXPANDING CONNECTI-**CUT PAID SICK DAYS is on the Senate calendar awaiting further action.

State Contracting Standards Board (SCSB)

Senate Bill 1223: AN ACT CONCERNING THE STATE CONTRACTING STAN-DARDS BOARD is on the Senate calendar awaiting further action.

FOIA Address Exemption Bill.

Senate Bill 1157: AN ACT CONCERNING REVISIONS TO THE FREEDOM OF IN-FORMATION ACT CON-**CERNING EMPLOYEES OF** PUBLIC AGENCIES is on the Senate calendar awaiting further action.



Early Voting Implementation and No-Excuse **Absentee Voting Constitutional** Amendment.

"There is no question that our schools are in crisis. Our students are in crisis. Our paraeducators are in crisis. The fight for adequate staffing and a living wage for paraeducators is far from over. We will no longer be overlooked.

"There is also no question that H.B. 6881 is part of the solution we need in order to address the 1,300 paraeducator vacancies statewide - a staffing shortage that is directly impacting the learning outcomes of our children.

"Finally, there is no question that Connecticut can afford it. We have a historic surplus in the billions and the political handcuffs that is the constitutional spending cap should not prevent us from making the necessary investments we need for our students."

In the News: Win Heimer, Council 400 Chapter 401

The following letter to the editor was published in the Hartford Courant on Saturday, April 22nd:

As executive director of the Connecticut Alliance for Retired Americans, I write on behalf of the 50,000 members of the CT Alliance. We are in strong support of I4-day early voting as presented in General Assembly Committee Bill 5004.

According to the National Alliance for Retired Americans, early ballots accounted for 41.3 percent of primary ballots last year, up 2 percentage points from 2006. In all, up to 70 percent of voters nationally have some access to early voting under state laws that permit voters to cast ballots before Election Day for any reason.

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, four states — Alabama, Connecticut, Mississippi, and New Hampshire — do not offer pre-Election Day in-person voting options for all voters.

Connecticut has some of the most restrictive voter laws in the nation and, unlike many of its neighbors in New England, has been slow to adopt changes designed to make voting easier, particularly for working people, the elderly and communities of color. It's high time that we leave the company of Alabama, Mississippi and New Hampshire and join the 46 states that have allowed early voting. We strongly urge support of Committee Bill 5004.

Who is Council 400? By: Kevin Sullivan, Retiree Organizer

With so many State of Connecticut employees retiring, we have been getting a lot of questions! Two of the most common questions are: "Who is Council 400?" and "Why do I need a union once I am retired?" As the Council 400 Retiree Organizer, I thought it would be appropriate to answer these questions!

Council 400 is a CSEA council made up of approximately 12,000 retired State of Connecticut Employees. They could have worked for any State Agency or been a member of any union. Some members were never even given the opportunity to join a union until they retired! Whether they worked as a behavioral specialist at one of our training schools, community college employee, an engineer at the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, a member of the Connecticut Leg-

islature, or any other position with the State - they are eligible to join Council 400. And many of them do!

So, why do retired people need a union? A union is much more than an insurance policy that keeps you from getting unnecessarily disciplined at work. A union is a collection of members who work together to accomplish a common goal. In our case, Council 400 holds regular meetings at each of our 27 different chapters, we have social activities, and a variety of committees. Our members attend rallies, testify on legislation, write letters and make phone calls - they fight to protect the retirement benefits you have worked so hard to earn!

We keep our Council 400 members notified of changes to the healthcare plan, legislative alerts, committee opportunities, social

events, etc. through our CSEA News, email updates, and our chapter meetings.

Members of Council 400 also gain access to our retiree team. We help with insurance or prescription issues and have direct access to agents at Aetna, Anthem and Cigna and can help resolve issues quickly. Our members have worked all over the State, in hundreds of different positions and agencies, under different union contracts. But they are all united under CSEA's Council 400. As our Council 400 members often say, "We are retired AND we are active!"

Council 400 union membership dues are only \$5 per month and may be taken directly out of your pension check - if you'd like. Stay active, stay informed, stay with CSEA & Council 400!

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
